Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

JANUARY 29, 2017

Zephaniah 2:3,3:12-13; 1 Corinthians 1:26-31;
 Matthew 5:1-12a

Matthew's Gospel is the most "Jewish" of the Gospels. It is structured around five great sermons or discourses of Jesus. The reason: There were five scrolls or books of Moses; Matthew shows Jesus as the "new Moses." The first of the sermons is the Sermon on the Mount. Moses went up on the mountain to receive the Holy Torah; Jesus goes up the mountain to proclaim the "new Law."

If we add the infancy story of Jesus and the Passion-Death-Resurrection narrative to the five sermons, we have seven units. The perfect number to the Jews was seven! These are but a few examples of the "Jewishness" of Matthew. Matthew wants to show Jesus as the fulfillment of all the promises made to the Jews.

Today's Gospel contains the opening words of the very first sermon recorded of Jesus, the Sermon on the Mount. The Beatitudes can be considered in many different ways. They may be an entirely new "value system": Jesus blesses humility; the world blesses pride. Jesus blesses the meek; the world extols the self-assertive. Jesus blesses those who are sorry for sin ("mourn"); the world never wants to admit a mistake. Jesus blesses the clean of heart; the world cherishes the risqué, the bawdy, and the immoral.

The Beatitudes might also be considered as the process of conversion: "Poor in spirit" means those who have nothing else to rely on; they must turn to God. Unless we realize our need for God, we won't turn to him. "Sorrowing" really means those who are sorry for sin. We must realize our sinfulness and want to turn away. We must hunger and thirst for holiness in order that the Lord may fill us with his saving grace. Then, in turn, if we show mercy to others, God will show us mercy.

The first reading, from Zephaniah, urges us to seek humility and justice. The second reading tells us that we aren't too sophisticated or wise; but no matter! God chooses those who are nothing to show his own powerful grace. Realize your need of God, your need to reform; hunger for holiness. The Lord will fill you.

The Church: Now let us see how the Magisterium helps us, faithful to accept dogma (a proclaimed doctrine) infallibly. The Latin word magister means teacher and magisterium comes from that word and it means teaching authority of Catholic Church. Pope Paul VI in his "Mysterium Ecclesiae" says, "The faithful need the assistance of the magisterium when internal disagreements arise and spread concerning a doctrine that must be believed or held, lest it loses the communion of the one faith in the one body of the Lord." We could see how the infallibility worked while the Church exercised her decision-making from the beginning of Christianity. But the term and its understanding was in its development. The first significant clarification came in the early fifth century when Nestorius questioned the dogma promulgated by Pope Celestine I. At the request of Nestorius, Emperor Theodosius II convoked a council at Ephesus. There, Papal legate read the statement, "There is no doubt, and in fact, it is known in all ages, that the holy and most blessed Peter, the head of the Apostles, pillar of the faith and foundation of the Catholic Church, received the keys of the kingdom from our Lord Jesus Christ, the Savior and Redeemer of humanity. To him was given the power of losing and binding sins, who even now and always, lives and judges in his successors. It was further clarified when the protestant reformers claimed that all the faithful are priests and, therefore, the hierarchy is no more divinely authorized to teach infallibly and all baptized Christians are same. But the council of Trent insisted that the bishops are successors of the apostles who were considered having a special rank in comparison with other believers since "they have been placed to rule the Church by the Holy Spirit" Acts 20, 29. St. Paul questioned, "Are they all apostles? All prophets? All evangelists? All pastors? All teachers? St. Proves that the hierarchy exist in Christ's way of the formation of his Church and Jesus protects the Church from error. Father Joe
