Second Sunday of Lent

MARCH 12, 2017

Genesis 12:1-4a; 2 Timothy 1:8b-10;
Matthew 17:1-9

Remember that Lent is devoted to baptism and baptismal renewal. Last week we saw that baptism does not mean freedom from temptation. As the Lord was tempted, so will we be tempted. We must daily struggle to overcome.

This week we see the profound meaning of our baptism: Through baptism, we are transformed into the image of Christ himself! But don't expect that everything is "glory."

Only once during his earthly life did Jesus allow his divinity to shine through his humanity. He was transfigured before three of the apostles. At all other times he looked like an ordinary human being. We may not "see" our divine baptismal dignity, but it is there; and we must reverence that image with humility and gratitude.

Our first reading tells of the call of Abraham. All nations and peoples will be blessed through a descendant of his. Abraham's call was great; our call to baptism is greater. We share in the blessing promised to him.

Our second reading tells us that the Gospel will also mean hardship. Jesus was divine; yet he suffered and died on the cross. We share his divine life; and we, too, must carry our crosses in union with him. Let us not rebel against our daily crosses; let us bear them joyfully.

The experience of the Transfiguration was intended to strengthen the disciples for the ordeal of the cross. It was to help them to see that the Messiah was not the triumphant and over-powering person expected, but was a suffering Messiah. If we want to follow Christ, we must follow him in his cross as well as in his resurrection.

The Church: Now, let us think about a crucial subject, the Church and State. In ancient times, the king was also the president of pagan religion. In Jewish religion, the Sanhedrin held the civil power as well. They were supposed to have equal competence in the field of religion and the secular domain. Jesus introduced an essential change to this system. He transferred everything about religion and moral to the Church independent of the power of the State. There are two categories we should consider. There are immutable elements because they come from divine designs and divine laws. And there are elements that are adaptable to different times and/or to different circumstances. It was when the Pharisees tried to trap Jesus, He made His significant statement. They asked Him if it was lawful to render tribute to Caesar. Jesus dealt with the trap saying, since the coin had come from Caesar, justice requires that it be returned to him. "Give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God" Lk 20,25. Rome, at that time, hindered a man's duties to God. In the normal sense, there should be no clash. In tune with the teaching of Jesus, Peter admonished the early church, "Accept the authority of every social institution. Honor the emperor and fear God" 1Peter 2,13-17. St. Paul's exhortation to the Romans remains to this day an epitome of the obedience that a Christian owes to civil rulers. "You must all obey the governing authorities, since all government comes from God. "Rom 13,1-6. All subsequent teaching on the duties of Christian citizens has appealed to this saying of St. Paul that there exists no authority that has not been authorized by God. Early church clearly distinguished between the spiritual allegiance they owed the Church and the civic loyalty that is due to the State. Right after the Edict of Constantine, Catholicism had become recognized and civil authorities found in religious unity their strongest support for political solidarity. But, in subsequent centuries, both Church leaders and Political leaders stepped onto the toes of each other which affected mutual relationship. Father Joe
